The Cork World Book Fest is approaching its mid-teenage years – often difficult but thankfully not for us!

The programme runs over five days, with back-to-back events all day and evening on Saturday 27th April, concluding with a celebration of new books by local writers. While this year we have a mixture of events – for all ages – due to popular demand, we have greatly expanded our programme of workshops (all free) for budding writers and will feature an all day programme at Cork City Library. The Fest complements other literary events in the city and region, but is quite different – putting readings and books on the street, for example. It is a participative, inclusive event, connecting readers with established and emerging Irish and international authors.

As we present our 15th Fest we would like to remember the late writer and critic Eileen Battersby who has been part of the Fest for the past two years and was an inspiration to all of us with her ideas and support for the 'literature in translation' aspect of our programme. Our literature in translation programme still remains a unique part of our programme and this year features writers from China, the U.S., Russia, Norway, Italy, Catalonia and the U.K. We also feature world class writers such as Tess Gallagher, Kit de Waal and Salley Vickers along with Irish writers, John Boyne, Nuala Ni Chonchuir, Louis de Paor and Harry Clifton.

In 2019 we have continued to include both visual art and music in the line-up.

We hope you enjoy the 15th Cork World Book Fest – it is you, the audience, who ensure its continued success each year.

OPENING NIGHT

The opening event of the 15th Cork World Book Fest is curated by Leanne O'Sullivan, who will introduce fellow poets Tess Gallagher and Harry Clifton. This is the second time that the Fest has had a guest curator – Paul Muldoon was the first – and we expect this to be a regular feature of future Fests.

Tess Gallagher

Poet, essayist, fiction writer and playwright – Tess Gallagher – was born in Port Angeles, Washington. Gallagher's poems in her new collection *ls, ls Not* are suspended between contradiction and beauty, upending our notions of linear time, and journeying toward discovering the full capacity of language.

Gallagher's poems



reverberate with the inward clarity of a bell struck on a mountaintop and hover daringly at the threshold of what language can nearly deliver while offering alternative corollaries as gifts of its failures. Guided by humour, grace, and a deep inquiry into the natural world, every poem


nudges us toward moments of awe.

Gallagher claims many Wests – the Northwest of America, the north-west of Ireland, and a West even further to the edge, beyond the physical. These landscapes are charged with invisible energies and inhabited by the people, living and dead, who shape Gallagher's poems and life.

She spends part of each year in the West of Ireland, near Sligo.



Eminent Irish poet Harry Clifton's new collection Herod's Dispensations revisits - in meditations on death and migration - the territories of the Far East from his early years, in the light of a new nomadic age.



Poems 1974-2004 (2014) and Portobello Sonnets (2017). He served as the fifth Ireland Professor of Poetry in 2010–2013.

Harry Clifton wrote about a recent visit to China in an article for *The Irish Times*. Poems about China are at the heart of his new poetry collection. Dublin-born Harry Clifton was poet-in-residence at the Frost Place in New Hampshire, an International Fellow at the University of Iowa, and a representative for Ireland at the International Writing Program in Iowa. He currently teaches at Trinity College Dublin's Oscar Wilde Centre and is a member of Aosdána.

The evening is curated and hosted by **Leanne O'Sullivan**, a native of the Beara peninsula. Her most recent collection A *Quarter of an Hour* was published in 2018. She teaches creative writing in UCC.



TEEN DAY AUTHOR VISIT: JOHN BOYNE



Louis de Paor is a key figure in the contemporary renaissance of poetry in Irish since 1980, and four times winner of the Oireachtas prize for the best collection of poems in Irish. He will host an evening paying tribute to the life and work of this great Cork-born Irish poet, who died in 2018.

Louis will be joined by two young poets Ailbhe Ní Ghearbhuigh and Séamus Barra Ó Súilleabháin.









AN EVENING OF CHINESE LITERATURE

Shi Yining is a graduate from Sun Yat-sen University. He started to publish works in 1985 and won the 12th China Book Prize. He has published many literary critic books and other genres of literary works.

He was the deputy chief-editor of Literature and Art Newspaper and is now the chiefeditor of National Literature, vice chairman of Mass Culture Society of China and Society of Writers of Ethnic Groups.


Zhang Weimin is president of Jilin Provincial Writers Association, member of the National Committee of China Writers Association and Literary Criticism Committee, and a standing member of China Contemporary Literature Research Society. He is also a visiting professor of Northeast Normal University and Ph.D. mentor. He has published a collection of literary criticism, Notes of Criticism.

Wang Shiyue is an editor, award winning novelist (Lu Xun Literature Prize and Novella of the Year 2011 of People's Literature Prize) and a member of the National Committee of China Writers Association, vice president of Guangdong Provincial Writers Association and deputy chief-editor of magazine Works. He has published many novels and short stories. His works have been translated into English, Russian, Italian and Spanish and adapted into films.

Zhu WenYing lives in Suzhou. She has published several novels and novellas. Her works have been translated into English, French, Japanese, Russian, German and Korean. She has been awarded many literature prizes in China. She is one of the organisers of the First Chinese Young Writers Visiting Program 2018, and the 10th and 11th Bookworm International Literary Festival

Born in 1972, Zou Yizhou has won many literary prizes, such as Lu Xun Literature Prize, Yu Dafu Literature Prize and New Literature Talent Prize of Mao Dun (founded by Chinese Literature Foundation). He is the associate editor of Yan He magazine, and a novelist.

Cork poet Patrick Cotter, Director, Munster Literature Centre, will introduce; Su Yue will translate from Mandarin to English.


RAISING THE BAR FOR NEW FICTION With Kit de Waal and Anne Griffin



A Multilingual Reading from a Multilingual Project

Sílvia Aymerich-Lemos, Catalan poet, translator and literary activist, presents the Multiple Versions project, which she co-founded with Kathleen McNerney to promote literary exchanges between poets in minority languages from across Europe. She has published a number of translations of European and American authors into Catalan. Her poetry has been rendered into Romanian, Polish and Italian for international anthologies. She has been awarded the Amadeu Oller Poetry Prize, the City of Elx Narrative Award and Honors Mention in Perpignan for Balsàmiques, a collection of poems on worldwide women poets. A tireless cross-cultural literary activist and researcher, she recently conducted a study on Catalan LabLit and gender under the patronage of the Catalan Department of Culture.

Presented by **Dr Yairen** Jerez of the Department of Spanish, Portuguese and Latin American Studies in UCC, she will read from her own poems and those of other poets/translators from the project, as well as presenting her recent translation into Catalan of Welsh poet Menna Elfyn's book Murmurs.



CELEBRATION OF NEW BOOKS by local writers



He has also published stories by Argentinean writer Alan Pauls for Mountain-islandglacier (Broken Dimanche Press, 2012) and Catalan writer Victor Balcells Matas from his debut collection Yo Mataré Monstruos por Ti (I Will Kill Monsters for You) (Editorial Delirio, 2010), one of which is forthcoming in The Stinging Fly translation special edition (Summer, 2013).



Frammenti [Fragments, 2013], an exhibition by Italian photographer Mario Badagliacca, will run for the week of Cork World Book Fest. It focuses on objects taken from asylum seekers and migrants as they arrived on the island of Lampedusa. Mobile phone parts, battered guidebooks, broken compasses and cigarette packets were all taken, and later disposed of, by the police. In documenting this collection of lost belongings, Badagliacca encourages us to reflect on the value of objects and the value of human life. His photographs tell stories of migration, displacement and hope, as they help us to trace the different subjectivities of their owners; their faces, voices, stories and journeys.




